His next opportunity for contact with the Europeans came in 1834 when the barque Harriett was wrecked on Cape Egmont. On receipt of the news of the disaster, it was Poarama who took a war party to rescue the Harriett's crew, although they were too late to prevent the green who being

Harriett's crew, although they were too late to prevent 12 of the crew from being killed and Mrs Guard and her two children carried off. But they were able to save the remainder and lead them to safety at Ngamotu.

After their defeat at Otaka it was, of course, only a matter of time before the Waikatos should return seeking revenge, and this came in 1835. Mikotahi pa, last stronghold of the Ngatiawa, fell and Poarama and his gallant people were taken into captivity.

From then on, during the from then on, during the troublous and often dangerous years before open warfare broke out between the races, Poarama took on the determined role of protector of the settlement, prepared even to fight his own tribesmen in defence of his newfound friends. However, it must be emphasised that this would have been a last resort; he was essentially a peace maker and on many occasions, some of them propably unknown to the settlers, he and his ally, Honi Ropiha, talked trouble away from the settled areas. ne settled area
