## High costs put squeeze on Garlic Press eatery

After four years in business, New Plymouth fine dining restaurant The Garlic Press has permanently closed its doors.

The eatery joined a string of retailers that had announced their closure on the city's main street in recent months.

The Garlic Press owner
Michael Williamson said the
Devon St West establishment
shut just before Christmas, but at
the time he had hoped to get
enough money together to be
able to reopen in February.

But on the restaurant's Facebook page on Wednesday it was announced the eatery would stay closed.

"We had a few hiccups along the way that put us out a bit," said Mr Williamson, who established the restaurant 4½ years ago.

He blamed increasing costs including wages, GST, and Kiwisaver contributions, as well as not being able to entice enough customers through the door, for the restaurant's closure.

"We missed a few opportunities along the way that we should have taken."

Mr Williamson, who was also a chef, said he thought they must have done something right to have lasted the time they did.

The closure of the restaurant

meant the loss of jobs for about 12 staff. Mr Williamson said he had given them notice before Christmas of the imminent closure, even though he had hoped to be able to reopen.

The Garlic Press had won a number of awards, including Outstanding Restaurant at the Halamoana Hospitality Awards in 2011 and a 2010 New Zealand Beef and Lamb Excellence award.

An auction for the restaurant's chattels will be held on February
