

Building toppled after marathon fire fight



Bennett and Sutton Ltd manager Mr Alistair Brown, Inglewood, at the clean-up operation after fire destroyed the store at the corner of Brougham St and Powderham St, New Plymouth, early today.

The fire-ravaged shell of a two-storey New Plymouth building was demolished today so firemen could extinguish a blaze which had been burning for more than 11 hours.

The fire was reported at 1.20am by two police constables and flames were still flickering from the inside of the building early this afternoon.

Bennett and Sutton Ltd on the corner of Powderham St and Brougham St was one of the oldest wooden buildings still in com-mercial use in New Plymouth

1890s

It was built some time between 1890 and 1900 for Sargood and Sons.

Taranaki director Mr Ron Lambert said the loss of the building was unfortunate as it had been one of the last remaining examples of turn of the century architecture in New Plymouth.

Michael Burke said the building had to be demolished because it was too dangerous for firemen to

A. J. Cowley Ltd, New Plymouth, did the demoli-

The building was owned by Mr Frank Hocken, Bell

The hardware store of Block, and his wife in a family trust.

Mr Hocken told the Herald there was little to be saved from the ruins.

"We'll salvage what we can for the insurance

Mr Hocken said there was \$250,000 worth of stock

The stock included building and plumbing supplies, china, crystal, hardware and sporting goods.

Danger

Because of the danger from the building. Brougham St between Devon St and Powderham St was closed, and traffic was restricted to one lane on Powderham St. Sand was dumped on

Brougham St to prevent hot timber from melting the tar as the walls were

brigade was lucky there was no wind. There were initial fears the fire could spread to other buildings in the inner city block, but it was contained

At the height of the blaze a total of eight appliances and 62 men from the New Plymouth, Waitara, Inglewood and Oakura brigades were fighting the fire. Another engine from Waitara was on standby at the city fire station.

Firemen had to use breathing apparatus because of the extensive smoke, which could be seen from many parts of New Plymouth.

Toobig

Six ordinary hoses and four hoses too big to be handled without machinery were used to fight the blaze, the cause of which is not known.

Mr Burke said the pital at 2.17am where the smell of smoke was reported. The brigade found the smoke was from the Bennett and Sutton building fire about 2km away

Police said they needed a respite from the torrential rains but the bureau warned early this morning there would be more showers and thunderstorms later this af-


A police spokesman said water surged through McLaren Vale, 40km south of Adelaide, overnight but there were no reports of damage.

Mr Wood said it had prevented the fire which destroyed the Bennett and Sutton building from spreading to his own.

He had always thought of the wall, towering above his building, as an earthquake risk.

Wood's was one of neighbouring businesses disrupted for

most of today because of the fire.

He said there was a risk of the damaged building collapsing on his premises so no-one was allowed inside. The power and telephone had also been disconnected, socarrying on business was

Mr Wood said several

people had approached his staff in the street to pay rents which the company collects from about 60 city houses.
