With glass bricks incorporated to ensure copiously lit interiors, he visualises an imposing modern building of four storeys overlooking Carrington Road and two storeys on the Liardet Street frontage, From Carrington Road each succeeding floor would be "stepped back," thus adding greatly to the appearance of the structure as it would be even from the western part of the town. An important feature of Mr. Darby's plan for recessed floors is that it would provide for a series of steps and landings capable of accommodating at least 4000 persons for open-air civic receptions.
